Jan Baran is a senior partner in the Washington, D.C., law firm of Wiley Rein LLP where he heads the firm's Election Law and Government Ethics practice group. He has been named one of D.C.'s top 50 lawyers by Washingtonian magazine. Baran and his practice group have received the top national ratings in their field from *Chambers USA*.

Baran is a counselor and litigator and has successfully argued First Amendment cases before the Supreme Court of the United States. He represented Senator Mitch McConnell and the Chamber of Commerce in *McConnell v. FEC*, the Supreme Court case that upheld most of the McCain-Feingold law.

Baran is author of *The Election Law Primer for Corporations* published by the American Bar Association now in its Fifth Edition, and is co-chair of the Practising Law Institute (PLI) annual conference on Corporate Political Activities. He is past chair of the ABA Standing Committee on Election Law.

During the 2000 Florida presidential vote recount, he was a legal consultant and analyst for ABC News and ABCNEWS.com and is a regular commentator on FOX News and NPR.

Baran has held various governmental posts. In 2001, he was a member of the Virginia Governor's Commission on Government Finance Reform. In 1991, President George Bush conferred on Baran the personal rank of Ambassador and Chairman of the U.S. Delegation to the World Administrative Radio Conference (WARC) in Torremolinos, Spain which concluded in March 1992. He previously served in government on President Bush's Commission on Federal Ethics Law Reform and, as Executive Assistant to the Chairman of the Federal Election Commission. He has participated as a member of U.S. and international observer delegations in connection with elections in The Philippines, Nicaragua, Pakistan, Serbia, Hungary, Romania and Czechoslovakia.

Baran was General Counsel of the 1988 Bush for President Campaign and served four years as General Counsel of the Republican National Committee.

A graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and Vanderbilt Law School where he was a Patrick Wilson Scholar of Law, Baran is a naturalized American citizen, having immigrated to this country in 1951. He and his wife, Kathryn Kavanagh, have four children and reside in Virginia.
